CAST OF CHARACTERS: (ages shown are as of 1936, when the show begins)

Luigi Tortorilla: An Italian immigrant (speaks with an Italian accent); age 47; short in stature but muscular; works at Griffin Wheel Company, a business that manufactures and repairs wheels for rail cars.

Assunta (Belinca) Tortorilla: Luigi's wife (speaks with an Italian accent); age 46; married to Luigi April 2, 1913; they have eight children:

- Norma Tortorilla: age 8.
- Johnny Tortorilla: age 15.
- Angelo Tortorilla: age 10.
- Harold Tortorilla: age 5.
- Mary Tortorilla, age 19
- Rosie Tortorilla, age 17
- Nina Tortorilla, age 13
- Della Tortorilla, age 11

Bill Sanders: age 65; a retired carpenter, now operates a grocery store from the living room of his house. Appearing to be a grouchy old man, he is actually very kind hearted.

Mary (O'Donnell) Sanders: Bill's wife, age 66; they have eight children. All of their children are not principle characters in this show and do not need to be included in the ensemble.

O'Donnell (OD) Sanders: Bill and Mary's seventh child, a cooper, age 27.

Tommy Sanders: OD's son, age 7

The Tortorilla and Sanders families live across the street from each other. Tommy Sanders' mother has died, so his grandparents, Bill and Mary, are raising him while his father, "OD" works.

Leo Sanders: Bill and Mary's fourth child; age 34; a machine operator; Leo is a big, tall, muscular man, with broad shoulders, not overweight, but muscular.

Primo & Clementina Amadeo: husband and wife, also Italian immigrants (speaks with Italian accents), neighbors of the Tortorillas.

A seller at the Farmer's Market

An unnamed neighbor boy: age 6 when he appears.

The Mayor and two city officials



Monsignor Koch: The pastor at St. Thomas Catholic Church and School; an ornery, old priest, age: late 60s.

The Assistant Parish Priest at St. Thomas Catholic Church, age: early 20s

A nun who teaches at St. Thomas Catholic School

A group of sailors, including Sailor 1 and Sailor 2

A Naval Officer

Two firemen

A Western Union Telegram delivery man

Two unnamed boys, in their early teens

Two unnamed policemen

The voice of a newsman/announcer, broadcasting on the radio

Receptionist in a hospital lobby

Frank and Greta McCain, an older married couple, in their late 60s

SETTING:

A community known as "Armourdale", a district in the lower part of the Kansas River valley (aka the "Kaw"river), in Kansas City, Kansas, close to the rail yards. The district was devastated by a flood in 1903, and again in 1951.

Time: Approximately 1936 to 1951.

Scene 1

The cast welcomes the audience to the show by singing "Armourdale", a satiric celebration of their community.

ACT I

Armourdale

Chorus: Armourdale! - It's on the river Kaw
The home of Ma and Pa
Armourdale! - Come visit and you'll see
That river hospitality
Cause Armourdale is home to me
Armourdale is home to me

We're not glamorous like in Hollywood But we are wondrous in fact we are quite good We don't have the charm of a gay Paree And you may be alarmed by some of what you see

Repeat Chorus

We don't have a beach like in Trinidad But the river's within reach in fact it's not half bad We don't have the pubs you'll find in Dublin But there are many places to get drunk in

Repeat Chorus

There's not the open space that's in Texas And blandness you will notice it in excess If we make you shiver, then that's just that And don't let anybody call us river rats

Repeat Chorus

The Colorado Mountains are unknown to us And if you give us crap you can expect a fuss Fifth Avenue is something we have never seen

Armoudale's the farthest we have ever been

Luigi Tortorilla and his oldest son Johnny are in their front yard sawing a log using a two-handled saw. Tommy Sanders, a neighbor boy, age 7 from across the street, is sitting on the end of the log that will be cut off. As they cut through the log, the end of the log falls to the ground and Tommy falls along with it.

Luigi: (looking at the boy) Stupid American!

Luigi and Johnny head inside where they sit down to dinner with the rest of the family.

Angelo: Why do I have to sit next to "Mexican."

Nina: (angrily) Stop calling me that!

Johnny: Why do you call her that anyway?

Angelo: Because she's the only one of the girls with straight hair.

And besides, it makes her mad!

Nina: (angrily shaking her fist at him) So you like making me mad!

I'll show you mad!

Assunta: Stop that! Now eat your dinner. Magña!

Della: I don't want to eat this! I don't like it.

Luigi: You eat what your mamma cooks. (Shaking his finger at her)

Your Mama don't have time to cook just for you!

Della (defiant): No! I'm not going to eat it!

Luigi, taking off his shoe he throws it at her, missing hitting her. Della leaves the table

Assunta: Luigi, why do you have to make beer in the bathtub? Why don't you buy beer?

Luigi: I like my beer.

Assunta: Yeah, but we can't take a bath. We have to take a bath in the sink.

Luigi: I'm gonna make beer in the tub, and I don't wanna hear any more about it!

Assunta: But Luigi.....

Luigi: (raising his index finger) Ah! Ah!

Assunta doesn't say any more about it.

Scene 2 – October, 1936

Luigi and Rosie are at the Farmer's Market in Kansas City, Missouri.

The chickens he is purchasing are live chickens. Baccalà is a salt cod fish that was very cheap and kept very well, which made it an ideal food for the poor.

Luigi and Rosie get on the trolley to head home. The other passengers are giving them condescending looks. Luigi embarrassingly just smiles and nods his head at them.

Luigi and Rosie arrive home. They are in the living room. The radio is on. Luigi: (to a seller at the market) I'll take two chicken and some baccalà.

Seller (to Rosie): You'll have to hold your nose all the way home with that fish!

Luigi: Aw, it smells good!

Seller: It smells strong! (Noticing something is wrong with Rosie)
What's wrong with the girl?

Luigi: She's got rickets. She's getting treatments. She'll be OK.

Luigi: (to Assunta): What did you do today?

Assunta: Missus Price come over. I gave her some meat.

Luigi: (surprised) 'Sunta! We don't have enough food for us!

Norma: I'll give you some of mine Mama.

Luigi: That's alright blondie (she has blonde hair at this age). You don't have to.

Assunta: I know, I know. But she's a done so much for us. She showed you how to take Rosie to the hospital for her treatments. She helped us learn English.

Luigi (teasingly): I learned more than you!

Assunta (playing along): You just think, since you became a citizen.

Luigi: (proudly) Yeah! Yeah! I'm now a citizen of this country. I'm pretty proud!

They hear a racket coming from their neighbors next door, Clementina and Primo Amadeo. Luigi goes to their house to see what is the matter and finds them fighting. Primo is beating his wife. Luigi pulls him away from her.

Luigi: (lifting Primo off the floor by the throat with one hand) If you don't stop hitting her, I'm gonna kill you! He then goes back home and enters the living room.

The rest of the family is now also in the living room listening to a newscast on the radio.

Assunta (to Luigi as he returns home) What's the matter with them?

Luigi: Primo was hitting her again. I made him stop.

Assunta (shaking her head and looking down) Ah, ah ah.

Newsman: The White House announced today that President Franklin D. Roosevelt will be coming to Kansas City, Missouri, on October 13. The President's agenda will include a speech to the ROTC candidates with the National Youth Administration, and another speech at the dedication of the new Municipal Auditorium. The President will get off the train in Argentine, on the Kansas side. The route for his motorcade will take him across the 12th street bridge into Armourdale, then east on Kansas Avenue and on over into Kansas City, Missouri.

Mary: (excitedly) Mama! Papa! Did you hear that?!!

Rosie: (excitedly) It's the President! The President is coming!

Johnny: (excitedly) That's really something!

Mary: (*excitedly*) Can you believe it! The President will be driving down 12th street! Right here in Armourdale! That's just one block over from us!

Rosie: (excitedly) Right here in Armourdale! Why would anyone want to live anywhere else when you can see the President right here in Armourdale?!

The day arrives and the Tortorilla family, the Sanders family, and all of their neighbors line up along 12th street and cheer as the President passes by, waving to the crowd.

Scene 3 -Nov. 17, 1936

Norma and Harold, the two youngest of the Tortorilla children, are sitting on their father's lap, one on each lap.

The children climb off their father's lap and go to the bedroom. Luigi and Assunta turn off the lights and also go to bed. The two youngest children are sleeping in the same room as their parents.

Assunta goes into the kitchen to get a glass of water. As she is leaving the kitchen, she sees a vision of the Virgin Mary. Startled, she drops the water and runs back to the bedroom. She finds that her husband has died.

Assunta: (addressing the kids) It's time for bed.

Luigi: (wakes up and sits up in bed) 'Sunta. Wake up. I don't feel so good.

Assunta: I'll get you some water.

Assunta: (shaking Luigi, trying to get him to respond) Luigi! Luigi!

Harold: Mama what is it?

Norma: Mama, what's wrong with Papa?

Assunta: (crying) Your Papa. He's gone.

Scene 4

The living room at the Tortorilla house. Funeral guests are leaving. After the last guest has left, Assunta and the kids sing "We're Not A Family."

Scene 5 - 1938

A ribbon cutting ceremony at the West Kansas
Avenue Bridge in the
Turner district of Kansas
City, Kansas. Tommy, now age 10, is the first in line to cross the new bridge on his bicycle.

After crossing the bridge, Tommy heads home. The scene is the living room of his grandparents, Bill and Mary Sanders. Bill

You have gone so far away
You made us happy throughout the day

We'll meet again we know it's true And there'll be nothing anyone could do That would keep us a-part We're not a family without you

Mayor (with two other city officials, cutting the ribbon): As mayor of Kansas City, Kansas, I hereby declare this bridge open and ready for traffic. (to Tommy) Are you ready to be the first person to cross this new bridge young man?

Tommy (excitedly) You bet, sir!

operates a small grocery store out of the living room. Bill, age 67, is a crotchety old man on the outside, but is very kindhearted on the inside.

There are a few shoppers talking amongst themselves.

The shoppers look at each other with surprise, wondering how someone could be so rude to his customers.

The news on the radio is over. As the shoppers make their purchases, a young neighbor boy, about 6 years old, comes inside the store. He pronounces the "t" of the word "time" as a "d" and drags out the vowel "i."

Scene 6 – Late 1938

The Tortorilla family is sitting at the kitchen table just finishing dinner, except for Mary, who is now married.

Bill: (sternly to the shoppers in his store) Alright everybody, be quiet! It's time for the news. I have to hear the news!

(He walks over to the radio and turns it up)

Shoppers: (still talking, but with the volume of the radio up, they start talking louder)

Bill: (shouting) I thought I told you all to pipe down, goddammit! I wanna hear the news!

Boy: (to Bill): What diiiime is it?

Bill: (looking at the clock) It's 6:20.

Boy: (leaves the store without buying anything)

Assunta: (to Johnny, as he heads towards the door) Where are you going?

Nina: He's a man and he just finished eating. (*To all the others*) Where do you think he's going!

They all laugh

Johnny: So I'm going to the outhouse. Big deal!

Johnny: (picking up some newspapers and a book of matches) It's cold out there.

The girls giggle.

Assunta: (leaving the room) I'm tired. I'm going to bed.

Della: (looking out of the window sees flames) Oh my god!

Somethings burning outside!

The other kids all rush outside to see the outhouse on fire. They sing "Set the Outhouse on Fire."

Set The Outhouse On Fire

Chorus: Johnny set the outhouse on fire
Although it maybe wasn't his desire
Still he set the outhouse on fire
Johnny set the outhouse on fire

Go get Mama now
She probably won't believe
She'll want to know just how
And then she'll be real peeved
He was trying to keep warm
But this is overkill
He'll wish he wasn't born
He didn't mean to, still

Repeat Chorus

Now what will we do
Without a place to go
I guess we will rebuild
And then I'll let you know
He wanted to keep warm
But now he's way too hot
The flames began to swarm
Then out of there he got

Then we ran all around

Scene 7

The Tortorilla house. The two youngest children, Norma and Harold, now ages 12 and 9 respectively, are in the kitchen with Assunta.

They go down to the railyard. Assunta, though small in stature, picks up a railroad tie, puts it across her shoulders and heads home. Norma and Harold stay behind picking up some coal that has fallen off the coal cars. There is a coal train sitting there. A man is standing on top of one of the cars and seeing that they are poor, throws some coal off of the car for them to pick up. They sing "Down by the Tracks"

Assunta: Norma, you and Harold come with me. We're gonna go down to the railroad tracks and get some coal and wood.

Down By The Tracks

Chorus: Well I'm sittin' in front of the fireplace In the early morn Although I'm by the fireplace It's not very warm

> I'm gonna go Down by the Tracks I'm gonna go Down by the Tracks I'm gonna get my lump of coal Then I'll head back home Down by the Tracks

Work is hard it can break your back Life is rough when you live Down by the Tracks

Repeat Chorus

We gotta have coal to keep warm

as they are picking up the coal.

As the songs gets near the

end, they head back

home.

So all the poor folks swarm Down by the Tracks

Repeat Chorus

Mama's at the stove in the kitchen Stirrin' a pot Tryin' to cook on the stove But it's not very hot

I'm gonna go Down by the Tracks I'm gonna go Down by the Tracks We need heat so we can cook And so some coal we took From by the Tracks

We got no money, you see But all the coal is free Down by the Tracks

Repeat Chorus

Well I'm sittin' in front of the fireplace The fireplace at home All - though I'm by the fireplace It's not very warm

Repeat Chorus

It's cold in our home, you know So we gotta get some coal Down by the Tracks

The engineer knows we're poor And so some coal he'll throw Down by the Tracks

Repeat Chorus

Norma and Harold arrive back home. They give the bag of coal to their mother, who is in the kitchen.

Norma: (to Harold) Let's go over to the Sanders' store and see if we can get some candy.

Harold: (with a big smile quickly shakes his head yes)

She reaches into a small purse, pulls out some change and gives it to them. They go over to the grocery store in the

Sanders' living room. Bill has caught some kids

stealing candy.

Bill: (yelling) Hey! You little sonsabitches! Put that candy back or pay for it!

Assunta: (firmly) No! You don't steal candy! Mr. Sanders is a nice

He chases after them, but they run away from him, laughing and picking up more candy as they leave the store. Looking at Norma and Harold, who are still there with astonished looks on their faces, he sings Munch Your Troubles Away.

Munch Your Troubles Away

When you come in to our house You know exactly where you are Brother is eating some peanuts Sister a candy bar

man. He's helped us a lot.

Munch munch munch munch your troubles away

(sitting down, pours himself a beer and picks up some pretzels)

The beer tastes good With the pretzels so thin We'll finish off the candy Then we'll eat again

Munch munch munch munch your troubles away

(the kids, peeking back in the door sing):

We'll get fat we don't care
If there's food we'll be there

(Bill continues the song)

Munch munch munch munch your troubles away

They'll have a snack after dinner They'll have a snack after the snack They'll have ice-cream for bedtime The refrigerator they'll attack Munch munch munch munch your troubles away

After he is finished singing this song, the boy who always comes in to ask what time it is, comes in again.

Boy: What diiiiime is it?

Bill: (angrily): Why do you always come in here asking what time it is? What do you think I am, a goddamn cuckoo clock?

Boy: (hanging his head) My mom tells me to come over and see what dime it is. We don't have a clock. My mom says we can't afford one.

Bill: (feeling sorry for the boy and ashamed that he shouted at him, picks up some candy, walks over to the boy and hands it to him) Well, you tell your mom that you are welcome to come over here anytime to check on the time or anything else you want. OK?

The boy nods his head in agreement and leaves

Scene 8

A classroom at St. Thomas Catholic School. Angelo and Norma are in the class. Monsignor Koch, the pastor of the parish, enters the classroom. Class: Good afternoon, Father!

Koch: Good afternoon class, (looking at the teacher) Sister.

Sister: Good afternoon Monsignor.

Koch: (taking the nun aside) What is it you wanted to see me

about?

Sister: It's Angelo. He's been acting up again.

Koch: (firmly) Angelo! Get up here.

Angelo goes to the front of the class. The priest grabs him by the ear.

Koch: (angrily) What are we gonna do with you, huh? You just

never learn, do you?

Angelo: Ow! Stop it! That hurts!

Koch: (calmer) Norma. Come here.

Norma rises and goes up to them.

Koch: Norma, I need for you to go home and get your mother. I need to talk to her about Angelo.

Norma (reluctantly): Not again! But I have to walk over a mile!

Koch: I know, but I need to talk to your mother.

Norma: You can talk to her after mass on Sunday.

Koch: No, I need to talk to her now.

Norma leaves to get Assunta

Koch: (calmer) Angelo, you need to stay out of trouble or you're not going to get your diploma.

Angelo: I don't care.

Koch: But without your diploma, you won't be able to go on to high school.

Angelo: I ain't goin' to high school. I ain't goin' to no more school! I hate school!

Koch: You better go to high school or Uncle Sam will get you!

Norma arrives back at the school with Assunta

Assunta: (to Koch) What'd he do? He's in trouble again?

Koch: I don't know what we're going to do with him, 'Sunta. He's always been a problem child. He's due to graduate this year, if he can stay out of trouble. I strongly recommend that you send him to the Catholic High School next year. The discipline there'll do him good.

Assunta: I can't afford to send him there. He'll go to the public school.

Koch: He can go to the Catholic High School, I'll pay for it. I'll pay to send Norma there too. These kids are Catholic. They should go to the Catholic High School.

Angelo: I ain't goin' to no High School.

Norma: I'll go, but I'll pay my own way.

Koch: I told your mother I'd pay your way.

Norma: I'll pay my own way.

Koch: How are you going to pay your own way?

Norma: I'll work.

Assunta: (notices a flyer on the wall advertising a bingo fundraiser

for the church) What's this?

Koch: We're having a bingo fundraiser for the church.

Assunta: It's gambling! It's a sin!

Koch: But we need money for the church.

Assunta: (scolding) It's a sin! The church shouldn't sin!

Koch: But Assunta, the church needs painting.

Assunta: (shaking her finger at him) No! You don't need to paint

the church. El Signor (God) don't care if the church is

painted!

They leave the school and head home.

Assunta: Angelo, I don' know what to do with you. I pray for you every day. Do you say your prayers every day?

Angelo: No.

Assunta: (shocked) Agh! Angelo! You have to pray or your gonna

go to hell!

Angelo: Aw mamma.

Assunta: (firmly) No, no, no! Don't you "oh mamma" me! You say

your prayers every day!

Angelo: I may not say the prayers that we learn in school, mamma.

But you know what? I find myself thinking about God and

Jesus all the time.

Assunta: Eh?

Angelo: That's right mamma. Every day. I think about stuff like that

all the time.

I Think About You All the Time

I talk to you every day
You guide me along the way
Your love for me is divine

And I, I think about you all the time.

Angelo sings "I Think About You All the Time." When I'm in need you always come through You help me know what to do You're always there for me on a dime And I, I think about you all the time

You give me friends to help me get through Until the day I come home to you You're helping me stay right in line And I, I think about you all the time

When I think about you, I just sigh Your love for me is so strong, it makes me wonder why

I know I'm not always good Don't do the things that I should But I'll says this, and it's not a line That I, I think about you all the time

When inspiration is what I need You give it to me and I succeed Your love for me - is so fine And I, I think about you all the time Eating breakfast or in my car When I'm at work or playing my guitar Thoughts of you come to mind 'Cause I think about you all the time

Scene 9 – 1939

Tommy and Angelo, now in their early teens, are walking home. They come across two other boys, about their age, who try to pick a fight.

Boy 1: Hey look! It's a couple of cat-licks from St. Thomas!

Boy 2: Yeah, not only are they cat-licks, but they're *poor* cat-licks.

Boy 1: And they're dirty. Poor, dirty, cat-licks! They're such poor cat-licks that they can't afford a bar of soap!

Tommy: We were down by the tracks picking up coal.

Angelo: At least we're not stupid Protestants like you!

Boy 2 (coming towards them): Hey!

Angelo: (raising his fist) Get outta here, before I knock the hell out of ya!

The other two boys walk away. Tommy and Angelo continue walking. They pass in front of a Pentecostal Church. Boy 2: (mumbling as he backs off) River rats!

They stop and look in a window. The people inside are speaking in tongues. The boys are making fun of them by imitating them and laughing.

Angelo: Hey Tommy, look! It's the Holy Rollers!

Tommy: (laughing) Holy Rollers.

After about a minute of this, they continue walking home.

Angelo: The high Church of the Holy Rollers!

They arrive at their houses, across the street from each other.

Angelo: See ya tomorrow, Tommy.

Angelo goes inside. Assunta and Norma are there in the living room. Tommy: Yeah, we have school tomorrow. Yuck!

Angelo: I'm going to my room.

He leaves the living room. The phone rings.

Assunta: (answering the phone) Hello? Yeah. Yeah. I'll send her over. (Hangs up the phone) Norma, go next door and help Clementina. She needs help with the baby. She's sick.

She leaves and goes to the Amadeo's house Norma: OK mama.

They start getting the baby ready when her husband, Primo comes home. He goes to the icebox and takes out some

Clementina: Thank you Norma. I'm not feeling well and I need you to help give the baby a bath.

sausage and cheese. He weighs it on a small scale.

Primo: (shouting angrily) Ah! You ate too much of my food! (He comes toward Clementina) I've told you, you only eat your share!

Clementina: (cowering, afraid) But I was hungry.

Primo: (yelling) No! You eat only what I tell you! You do as I say.

He starts beating her. Norma is afraid and runs home.

Norma: (entering the house, shouting, panicking) Mama! Mama! Come quick.

Assunta: What's the matter?

Norma: It's Primo! He's beating Clementina again! I think he's gonna kill her!

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Assunta: (shouting, trying to break it up) Primo! Primo! Stop! Leave her alone!

They both run back to the Amadeo's house next door and find Primo still beating his wife.

Primo then makes an aggressive move towards Assunta and tries to hit her. She is standing in front of the fireplace and picks up a fireplace poker. Swinging it at him she keeps him away from her. Two policemen arrive, drag Primo out of the house and start beating him.

The two policemen take him away.

Policeman: I've told you before, you can't beat your wife!

Primo: She's my wife. I beat her if I want.

Policeman: No. You can't do that. Not in this country!

Scene 10

The Tortorilla family living room. It is Christmas time. There is a small tree in the corner with very few decorations and no presents under the tree. Assunta and the kids are sitting in the living room, listening to the radio.

Assunta then sings Some Christmas.

Assunta: You know, kids, we won't have of a Christmas again this year. We're too poor. If we didn't have a garden, and you older kids didn't work, we would have nothing to eat.

Rosie: Thank God that nice man who worked with Papa got me my job working for those rich people in Overland Park.

Johnny: And it's a good thing Mr. Zanatta got me my job at the winery.

Assunta: (to Johnny) Someday, you'll go back to school. Someday. Someday, things'll be better. Someday, we'll have enough to eat. Someday, we'll have enough coal to keep-a warm. Someday, we'll have a good Christmas.

Some Christmas

Some Christmas, things will be alright I'll be all warm and cozy, by the Christmas tree's light Some Christmas, it's not just a dream There'll be a future Christmas
When I have all that I need

I'm not sad, in fact I'm glad 'Cause I know it will come true It won't be luck, I'll have some bucks 'Cause I'm doin' all I can do

Harold: Oh no! We all know what that means.

Norma: (sadly) Yeah. Somebody in our neighborhood is about to get some bad news.

Harold: (sadly) Yeah. Somebody has lost a loved one in the war.

Norma: I worry a lot, now with Johnny in the Air Force and Angelo getting drafted into the Army.

Harold: Me too. I hope they're all right.

They go inside. Assunta, Rosie, and Rosie's husband, Ray are there.

Rosie: Hi! Norma, Harold, you remember my husband Ray?

Norma: (in a disgusting tone) Yeah, we know 'im. What are you doin' here? I thought you were in the service, fighting the war.

Ray: I'm on leave.

Norma: Leave, again? Seems like you're always on leave!

Harold: How did you guys meet again?

Rosie: Harold, we've told you that before. I answered an ad in a magazine. (Acting like she's reading the ad) "Lonely servicemen looking for wives."

Assunta: That's no way to get a husband.

Harold: (looking into the kitchen, sees a refrigerator) Hey! What's that?

Ray: It's a refrigerator!

Harold: A 'frigerator? What's a 'frigerator?

Rosie: It's like an ice-box, only you don't need any ice! It's the latest thing! Ray got it for mama!

Assunta: (to Ray, doubtful) Where'd you get it?

Ray: I got it from a friend of mine.

Assunta: How did you buy it? You don't have any money.

Ray: (reassuringly) Now don't you worry about that! It's a gift!

Don't worry about it.

Assunta: (to Rosie) He's no good.

Scene 12 - March 1945

The Tortorilla family living room. There is a knock at the door.

Nina answers the door. There is a Western Union man standing there.

Nina (gasping in shock): No!

WU Man: Telegraph for a Mrs. Assunta Tortorilla.

Nina (getting choked up, in disbelief): I can take it.

She takes the telegram and signs for it. As she opens it, Norma and Harold come running towards her.

Norma: Oh no! Is it.....?

Nina: (softly, and starting to cry) It's from the United States Army. It says that Angelo has been killed in Germany. (reading the telegram) It says that the nation is grateful for his devoted and selfless service to our country.

Assunta: (crying) No! No! Angelo! Angelo!

As they comfort each other, they begin

> Nina: Remember how he used to call me "Mexican"? That used to make me so mad!

Harold: He liked to tease.

Nina: I remember how he used to always get in trouble at school. Drove ol' Koch nuts! He was a rascal, but he had a good heart.

Norma: (to Assunta) Mama, remember when he had his appendix out? We went to see him in the hospital. He asked you to bring him some bread. When we got there with the bread, they weren't gonna let you take it in. They said it was against the rules. But you took it to him anyway.

Assunta: I said, My boy wants bread,..... he gets bread!

Norma: (shaking her head) Oh, Angelo. We'll never forget you.

Luigi now appears as a ghost off to one side of the stage, visible only to the audience he sings "Little Did She Know."

reminiscing about Angelo.

They get into the car and are driving. They approach an intersection where a traffic cop is directing traffic. The cop

waves them on to go through the intersection. As soon as Leo starts to proceed, the policeman holds up his hand again, indicating that he wants him to stop.

Policeman: (noticing that Leo is much larger, waves him through

the intersection) Move on. Move on.

Scene 14

The living room of the Tortorilla house. Assunta is there sewing. Harold and Norma are also there. There is a knock on the door.

Harold: (answering the door) Ah! Come in. Come in Father.

It is the young assistant priest from the Catholic church. It's summer and he is wearing shorts.

Priest: Are you ready?

Harold: Yeah. (*To Assunta*) Mama, we're going to the show.

Assunta: (surprised) Huh? (To the priest) You shouldn't go to the show.

Priest: Why not?

Assunta: Your a prete (*priest*). You don't go to the show. (*Looking at his legs*) And' you shouldn't wear shorts! (*Saying firmly*) Your a *prete*!

Priest: (laughing) Aw' mis' Tortorilla. (to Harold) Come on, let's go.

They leave and as they go out, Della and Nina enter. They have shorter hair.

Assunta: (*surprised, seeing that they have cut their hair*) What did you do to your hair?

Della: We got it cut.

Nina: Yeah, do you like it?

Assunta (emphatically): No, no, no!

Della: Why not?

Nina: It's the latest style!

Assunta: Women should not cut their hair!

Nina: Why not?

Assunta: The Blessed Virgin had long hair. It's a sin for women to cut-a their hair. Your gonna go to hell!

Della & Nina (laughing) Oh, mama!

Assunta: (dejectedly) Aw. I should've been a nun. I wanted to be a nun. But I got married instead.

Norma: Well mama, if you wanted to be a nun, why didn't you become a nun?

Assunta: Because, your papa, he said if I didn't marry him,..... he was gonna kill himself.

Norma (laughing): Oh mama! Papa wouldn't have killed himself!

Assunta: Yeah, yeah. That's what he said. He's gonna kill himself.

Rosie enters carrying a baby and sits down. She is crying.

Assunta: Eh, what's the matter with you?

Rosie (sobbing): It's Ray. I haven't heard from him in over a week! I've called everyone I can think of. No one knows where he is. I've looked everywhere he might be. There's no sign of him. He's just disappeared. He left me and the baby.

Della: Why didn't you tell us this before?

Rosie: I didn't want to worry anyone. Besides, I thought he would come back. He hasn't been around here, has he?

Norma: No, we haven't seen him.

Johnny walks in. He heard some of the conversation.

Johnny: Rose, I think I may know what happened.

Rosie: What?

Johnny: I'm afraid I've got some bad news.

Rosie: What is it?

Johnny: As you know, we were all kind of suspicious of him, especially after he got mama that refrigerator and wouldn't say where he got it. So I thought I should do some checking up on him. I hope you don't hate me, but I just felt like he was up to no good.

Rosie: What?

Johnny: Well, I found out that he wasn't really in the service.

Everyone gasps in surprise

Rosie: What? He wasn't in the service?

Johnny: No. He was impersonating a military serviceman.

Rosie: I can't believe it!

Johnny: He probably thought he should high-tail it outta here before somebody found out and turned him in.

The home of "OD"
Sanders. OD is sitting in a
chair, reading a
newspaper. His son,
Tommy walks in.

Tommy: (questioningly) Dad?

OD: What is it?

Tommy: I want to join the Navy.

OD: The Navy? Why do you want to join the Navy? The war ended last year.

Tommy: I just want to join.

OD: Well, ... you can't join, you're too young.

Tommy: I know, but they said I can join if you sign, giving me your

permission.

OD: Well, you don't have my permission.

Tommy: Why not?

OD: You're too damn young! Wait till next year and you'll be old enough to join on your own.

Tommy: I don't want to wait another year. I have something here that they gave me at the recruiting office. All you need to do is sign it.

OD: No. Forget it. Why do you want to join right now anyway?

Tommy: I need to get out of here. I need to get away. Come on dad (handing him the document), just sign it.

OD: (taking the document, reluctantly) Well, I guess if the recruiters say it's OK (signing the document), it must be OK.

Scene 16

Two years have gone by and Tommy is still in the Navy. The sailors are standing on deck for an inspection.

The officer then leaves.

The sailors are at ease and are talking amongst themselves. Tommy is talking with two other sailors.

Tommy (picking up his hat & shaking his head): That dumb-shit!

Norma: (picks up the phone and calls Tommy) May I speak to Tom Sanders please?......

Tommy: Parts, Tom.

Norma: Tommy! You need to get home right away! The fire department is starting to evacuate everybody. They say the levee's gonna break!

Tommy: I can be on my way right now, but maybe you should leave with someone else.

Norma: They just started the evacuation. The firemen told me that if you leave right now, you should be home in plenty of time.

Norma (carrying the baby): We won't need to. I've set everything we want to save on the bed. So has the McCain's. The water won't get as high as the second floor. Uncle Leo said we could stay with them until we are able to find a place to live.

They head for the door.

There are two laundry baskets sitting on the bed. He grabs one of them and goes out the door.

Norma: Wait! We will need clothes. I put some clothes for us in a laundry basket on the bed.

Tommy: You go on out and get in the car. I'll grab the clothes.

Scene 21

The stage is dark. The audience hears a radio program.

Newsman: That was "Come On-a My House" sung by Rosemary Clooney. And now for the news. The flood in Kansas City is worse than expected. Approximately 15,000 people in the Armourdale and Argentine areas have been evacuated. Two-story houses in Armourdale had water all the way to their roofs. The flood has claimed the lives of 17 people in Kansas and Missouri. This is the greatest catastrophe in the history of the region.

With scenes of devastation in the background, the ensemble sings "Goodbye to Armourdale."

Tommy: Well, at least we know we'll have a place to live.

Norma: Yeah, it's a good thing we started building that new house in Argentine. (to Leo) We shouldn't have to live here for

very long.

Leo (to Tommy): You should've moved out in the country, Tom.

You know, someplace like out there in Bonner

Springs, where your mom's folks live.

Remember? You used to ride your bike out there

all the time and visit them.

Tommy: Nah. We wouldn't be able to afford it. (*To Norma*) But wouldn't it have been great though? Having a few acres out there in the country?

Norma: (looks toward the floor and nods in agreement).

Leo: If you could, you'd all be dancing around here singing about how you're gonna move way out in the country!
